- Available to statutory undertakers for the undertaking
































- Statutory Undertakers must have regard to conserving biodiversity (Natural Environment & Rural Communities Act 2006.
- Should not be irresponsible with regard to management.
- Should be adopting a code of practice, method statements, NJUG principles etc.
- Necessary, not desirable management.



Protected Trees Map






Spotlight On Bromley


Bromley Council has taken steps to protect a group of mature trackside trees that are likely to be targeted in the rail operator's plans to fell all 'leaf-fall' species

- 1. Safety critical works
- 2. Leaf fall


















Does Network Rail need permission to fell trees?

As the management of trees is generally on Network Rail land, permission is not usually needed. Where there is a Tree Preservation Order or the location is within a Conservation Area, we work with the Local Planning Authority.

Where Network Rail land has been designated as a Site of Special Scientific Interest, or has other statutory protection, we work with the regulators to make sure that our work is in accordance with the legislation.

TPO Applications

- History of TPO applications submitted on behalf of Network Rail.
- Decisions subject to appeal procedure.
